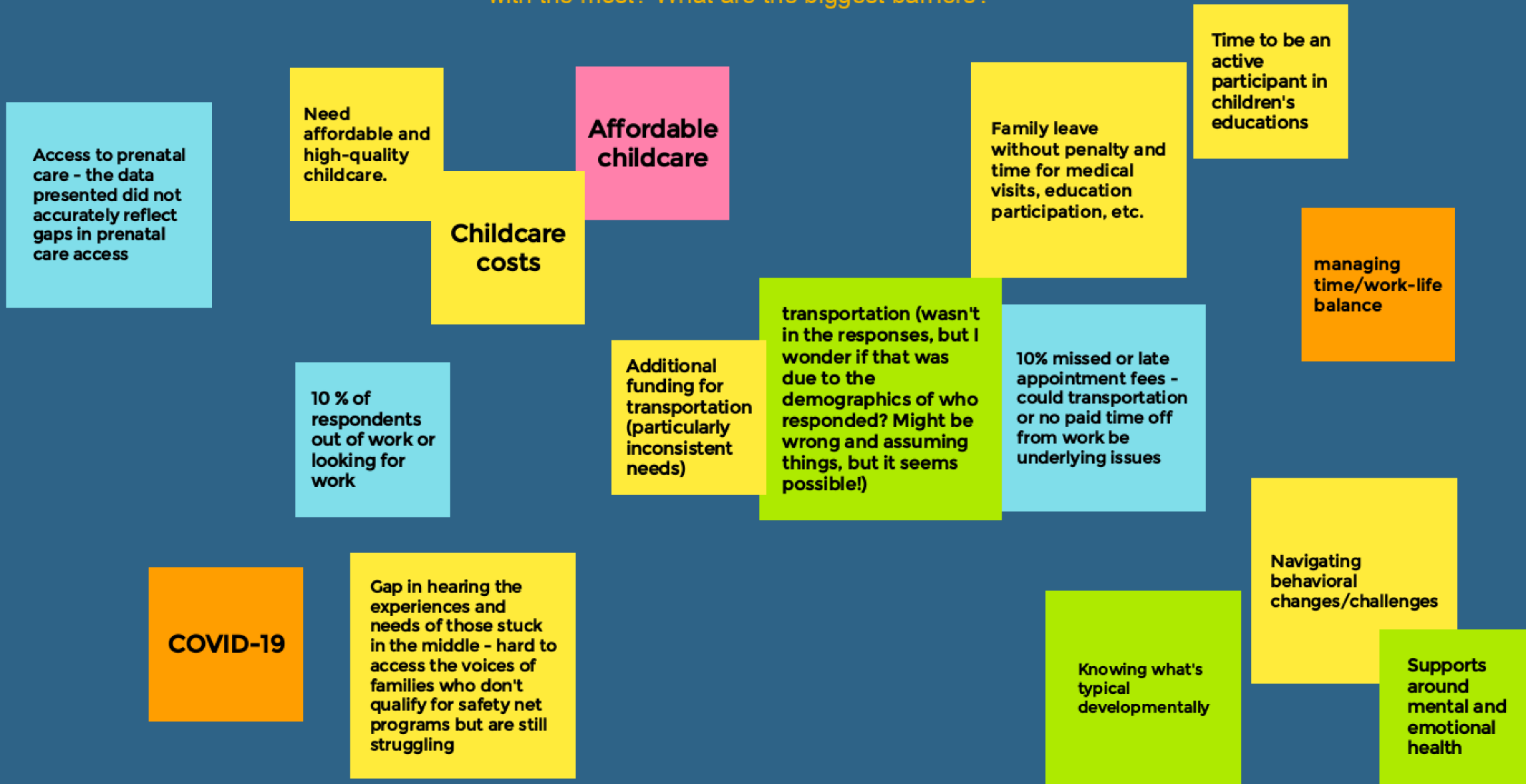


Based on these results, what are parents struggling with the most? What are the biggest barriers?



Parents proposed ideas that would make Durham a better place for families with young children. Which ones do you think are the most important for the ECAP to include?

[Better advertisement] of the events that take place in Durham: Light-up Durham, Durham Festi-Bull, Bimbe Festival (includes youth 0-8 in the activities) but is family driven overall

living wages for childcare providers

more access to safety net programs BEFORE families are in crisis

prenatal and pediatric centering groups

Access to care - both prenatal and pp

early childhood development/timeline included in prenatal education so that parents know what's expected and what's ahead

Education on social/emotional development

Basic child development information in a centralized location with links to resources

evaluate duration of services/resources provided to families to prevent destabilization

expand Medicaid services beyond "family planning" and "pregnancy"

insurance paid doula services

universal pre-k

Sliding scale, income-based child care financial considerations that are standard across the board for all families

housing vouchers

Flexible paid family leave

Robust support for engagement of additional caregivers (fathers, grandparents)

Have childcare facilities include peer-to-peer support options

E.g. assessing barriers to participating in high quality childcare with Latinx families

Transportation use? Which services are being used and which ones need additional development

Evaluation of peer-to-peer support (interest and utility)

digging into why black families/Hispanic families were very interested in support/programs

why people didn't want their child to receive well-child visits

Target low-income families for focus groups to ensure their needs/viewpoints are represented

digging into why only 11% of white families were "extremely interested" in services/programs

increased issue of missed/late visit fees in 13-36 month range - link to preventive visit goal

hearing more from low-income populations regarding access to prenatal/postpartum care

Men's input, especially differences in thinking about time/self-care/work life balance

are struggling but not yet eligible for safety net programs. For example, a family who is homeless can access MANY more resources than those who are displaced or housing insecure. How can we PREVENT these families from

Paid family leave options (talk to top 25 employers in Durham)

Teen moms: Affordable child care, housing (homelessness), livable wages

Students with disabilities (PreK-8): Early Interventions, supports, connections between the school, home, and community, mental/emotional/behavioral services collaboration, etc
